What do we stand for? Our priorities

- --> Meal vouchers are a healthy(ier) choice for our employees. The selection offered by the non-profit organization ALMA does not meet the KU Leuven employees' needs, and thus fails as a complete personnel restaurant.
- --> Wouldn't the mobility policy benefit from a commute / cycling allowance, rather than providing the so-called "(E)2WD" bike, that doesn't answer everyone's needs and are often defective?
- --> For years, the work load has been increasing (with this corona pandemic as dreary peak). ACLVB KU Leuven keeps demanding the correct measures and correct wages and overtime or Sunday work time compensations (also for academic personnel!).
- --> ACLVB KU Leuven has been insisting repeatedly without any avail during these corona situations on granting the fiscally interesting *telework fee* to cover the extra costs in working at home.
- --> ACLVB KU Leuven urges specifically for the ATP since 2012 to review the harsh, and sometimes unjust OFD (organization and function design) reality, because of which people are pushed into boxes, and can never advance in their career. OFD 2.0 still has a very long way to go.
- --> ACLVB KU Leuven team (45 candidates and a secretary, amongst whom 4 lawyers) support colleagues in need in word and deeds.
